Cardiac arrests can happen to anyone.

Many of us will witness a cardiac arrest in our lifetime.

Be ready for that day with this free training course, to be held in East Knoyle.

On this short course (no more than 90 minutes) you will learn to recognise the signs of cardiac arrest, how and when to perform CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and how to use a defibrillator.

Are you interested?

The Parish Council will be organising this free training course, which can be run only on a weekday. We need to know the likely numbers in order to see how many sessions are required. The training is run by a professional first aid training organisation, sourced through the British Heart Foundation. Once we have determined the level of commitment we can organise the event, which we envisage as being 2 or 3 sessions spread over one day.

What3words -- A possible life saver

There was recently an urgent health crisis about a mile outside the village. Emergency services were called, and two ambulances, two police cars, a fire engine and a helicopter from all over Wiltshire managed to locate the incident promptly, primarily due to the use of **what3words**. This is a free app which can be downloaded on to a smartphone and has divided the whole world into 3m squares. Each square has its own unique 3 word description and is being used increasingly by all sorts of people or organisations who live or work in rural and urban areas, including delivery drivers.

You might find the app helpful - in an emergency or for everyday use. Just search- What3words

Knoyle House Grounds

Most of you will be aware of the tremendous work the group of volunteers put in to improve the facilities and playground area at Knoyle House Grounds. All the wooden play equipment (and the gates!) were cleaned, refurbished and treated, and mended where necessary. The metal items have also been checked and serviced and painted. The areas around the swings and slides have been underpinned with rubber matting and a new layer of playground quality woodchip has been laid. Only the 'tunnel' is left for any major work – this will happen soon. So huge thanks to the volunteers and to those who generously donated to the appeal. Because so much of the work has been done by the volunteers, we still have funds that are ring-fenced for the future maintenance and improvements that will always be necessary. A wonderful community effort – thank you all.

Falling Trees and Fly-tipping

If you come across a fallen tree or large branch blocking a road or see some rubbish fly-tipped the quickest way to get something done is to contact Wiltshire Council – using the MyWilts online service is very efficient based on recent experience. (You can also ring them). Contacting the Clerk first actually delays the process as he has check where it is and then report it – via MyWilts! We have no 'hotline' to Wiltshire Council and do not have access to the required resources.

VACANCY FOR PARISH CLERK

Our current Clerk is retiring, so East Knoyle Parish Council wishes to appoint a Parish Clerk. This is a part time position, currently taking 20 hours per month, working primarily from home, though attendance is required at the monthly Parish Council meetings.

Your responsibilities will include preparing meeting agendas and supporting papers, attending Council meetings and taking minutes, dealing with correspondence and keeping accurate financial records.

The applicant should have good computer, administrative and communications skills. A Windows laptop using Microsoft applications is provided for Council business. The retiring clerk will provide training and ongoing support.

Renumeration will be dependent on experience and is based on the NJC pay scale.

Once again, this has been quite a time of change for the hamlets making up East Knoyle.

Sadly we record the death of Connie Haydon, who had lived at Orchard House with her husband Nick, and continued there after his death. Many residents will remember seeing her striding out, usually wearing a hat and wielding two walking poles. As her health began to deteriorate she moved to a flat in London, where she died on July 23rd at the age of 77. Her ashes were interred here in East Knoyle a month later, where she is remembered fondly by her friends and neighbours.

Leading lights of the Flower and Vegetable Show are set to find pastures new. Christine and Ben Battle are moving from Wise House (formerly Slades) to Semley, where we are sure they will soon be an integral part of the village. Thankfully they are near enough to come back and see us all!

At the northern end of the village, we say goodbye and thank you to Ian, Dawn and Tim Small – again to temporary accommodation while they research the perfect spot. Dawn and Ian have played a full part in village life over the last 16 years, even while running their businesses in Shaftesbury and Salisbury. Ian brought his accounting skills to the job of finance officer for the Parish Council, and Dawn was a prime contributor to this Newsletter's commemorative booklet "East Knoyle & The Great War".

Now we can move on to the arrivals. First of all, "thank you" from Hayley and Aaron for the wonderful welcome of their newborn baby girl – they are touched by the warmth and kindness of everyone in the village.

Tom, Tilly and Freddie Meade have moved to The Green from London. They are very much enjoying finding the village so friendly and discovering all that the area has to offer - the footpaths, the shop and the pub...but not necessarily in that order! We hope they soon feel really at home.

Right in the centre, betwixt the shop and the church, a warm welcome goes to James Brewster who has swapped Somerset for Wiltshire. We are sure he won't regret the move.

Once again, the Round and About Team are aware of several people who have had to spend a number of weeks in hospital, and hope that they are now well on the way to a good recovery.

Lastly, a couple of interesting meetings: two members of the Brockway family, one from Australia and one from Winchester, called into the village recently to see where their forebears originated. They went to the shop and were, of course, then directed to visit Joan Claydon who was happy to share what she knew of the family's history. They were also able to come back to the fete and enjoyed looking through the archives on display and seeing Strongs Cottage, which had been the Brockway family home. At a mutual friend's birthday lunch in Malvern, Stephen and Sue Dawson came across Lynn and Liam Curran, formerly of Red House Farm who, now living near Stamford, send all good wishes to anyone who remembers them.



East Knoyle Rainfall May and June 2024

East Knoyle rainfall July and August 2024

JULY was a rainy month. We had 4.15" (105.5mm) of rain in July 2024. The 30-year average for July is 2.28" (57.94mm). So, in July this year, rainfall was about 80% higher than the 30-year average.

AUGUST. We had a measly 1.75" (44.45mm) of rain in August 2024, most of which (1.22", 31mm) fell in just one day, 22 August. The 30-year average for August is 2.81" (71.37mm). So we had only had about 62% of expected rainfall in the month. Gardens and fields are dry but there has been just enough to keep grass growing

Nat for livestock, and the dry August has allowed farmers complete the harvest in good time.

If your German is even worse than mine. this means 'I haven't got a clue' - perhaps not the most useful phrase if I ever wanted to ask directions or buy a drink!

"COME AND SEE"

Or perhaps it isn't so worthless a phrase......

I recently listened to, and recommend, Rory Stewart's Radio 4 series 'The Long History of Ignorance'. Stewart, a writer, broadcaster and former politician, challenges the simplistic assumption that knowledge is good and

ignorance is bad. Exploring the issue in terms of science, politics, personal relationships and belief systems, he argues that simply acquiring more knowledge will not solve every problem. Ignorance can even be positive. In trials for a new drug participants will deliberately be left ignorant of whether they have been given it. No parent would want their every thought to be instantly known by their child - if the screaming toddler, or moody teenager knew that their parent, however fleetingly, was wishing they'd never been born, that would be unspeakably damaging!

Stewart also explores the impossibility of knowing 'everything' about any complex situation, let alone being able to predict all possible outcomes of our actions. (Having found himself Minister for Africa, before setting foot on the continent, he was keenly aware of how ill-prepared politicians often are for making key decisions.) He also drew in religious thinkers, such as Rowan Williams, who spoke powerfully of how an awareness of the limits of our own understanding should be at the heart of any religious faith. What's the point in worshipping a God our human minds could fully 'comprehend'. It is our 'certainties' that cause hatred and sectarianism.

Stewart argues that what matters is to recognise just how ignorant we are - knowing we don't know everything is more important than anything else. A greater awareness of our ignorance could open us up to make better decisions and become better, wiser, people.

So I'm beginning to think that perhaps my one German phrase isn't so useless. 'I haven't got a clue' about so much in our world, but if realising that makes me more humble, less opinionated and a more attentive listener, then it might be a motto to live by.

In the early 1950's someone must have pulled some strings and had 8 official aerial photos taken of a large part of the village centred on Knoyle Place. I imagine that it was the Fison family who lived there at the time and were influential and affluent. These photos are easily accessed online in the following steps.

- 1. Search: historicengland.org.uk
- 2. Press/click search the site. THIS IS IN TOP RIGHT CORNER
- 3. Scroll down to: 'aerial photo explorer' and press/click on it.
- 4. Scroll down to the map and enlarge it (ignore the honeycomb effect) until place names appear, then centre on East Knoyle. Cary on enlarging until a purple dot is visible, enlarge it and it will change to 8 separate purple markers-these are the 8 separate positions for the 8 photos.
- 5. Clicking/tapping on any marker will give you access (with a further tap) to the actual photograph. This can be enlarged with further double taps for exploration. I include one example here.


It is fascinating to see the changes in the village. Look out for the extensive areas devoted to growing vegetables (remember the war had only recently ended); look at the wonderful old orchard in the field opposite the village hall. Try to find the house in Holloway called Beeches which was in the process of being built for the retired village schoolmaster. Notice how small the houses

looked before the modern passion for extensions; they were then much more prepared to live in very crowded conditions- our house (Glebe Cottage) was

then two cottages for two families, and an earlier census showed each having 8 children. No wonder the school flourished down the road.

Moviola

September, October 2024 It's September, so it must be Moviola time!

We're starting our Autumn season on Wednesday 25 th September with a comedy to lift the spirits, which couldn't be more British, as it's set in Littlehampton, West Sussex! WICKED LITTLE LETTERS (15) is based on a stranger-than-fiction true story from the 1920s, starring Olivia Coleman, Jesse Buckley and Timothy Spall. The upright citizens of this small town, and particularly the deeply conservative Edith Swann (Olivia Coleman), start to receive anonymous letters full of absurd profanities. Rowdy Irish incomer Rose is accused of sending them and the ensuing trial causes an uproar. However, when stolid, investigative policewoman (yes, there were policewomen in the 1920s apparently) digs deeper, other realities come to light. This is a very light-hearted and entertaining film with excellent performances from a classy cast. You are unlikely to be offended by the 'language', as it is mostly so bizarre as to be laughable.

Completely differently, on Wednesday 23 rd October we have WILDING (PG). This documentary is one for all gardeners, animal and countryside lovers. Isabella Tree and her husband Charlie have inherited a country estate (again in Sussex) where the soil is exhausted and very little grows. They decide to abandon the place to nature, and the film follows the reclamation of this space by birds, bugs, deer, pigs, cattle and a great variety of plant life. The cinematography is beautiful, and Isabella Tree presents serious ideas of nurturing the land. There are, however, also some lighter moments involving a horse called Duncan and some pigs who behave badly at a charity event. Many questions of the sustainability of such an enterprise are not necessarily fully answered, but this film has been very wellregarded and will certainly stimulate debate on the way home!

A special mention must be made of all the children who entered their classes with enthusiasm and skill, and congratulations to them all.














East Knoyle Village Fete and Dog Show




